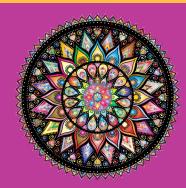

"Five phase mindfulness approach": From a Frontline COVID-19 Physician in the EBMC Sangha



Dr. Suresh Rangarajan says, "For busy primary care providers, the psychological burden of the pandemic on our patients is truly the iceberg under the water line. Never have we been asked to deliver more mental health support to these patients. In medical training, most physicians are taught to fix physical problems and to a more limited extent mental health issues. We were not trained to be therapists or life coaches. ... Based on my personal experience, I started to advocate a five phase mindfulness approach to my patients to help them 'get their feet underneath them again' and to start to build the foundation for a postpandemic life. The vast majority of my patients have found these practices very helpful."
